- May be accompanied by unrelated adults who claim to be guardians

What is Human Trafficking?

Human trafficking is the *recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring or receipt of persons* by means of:

- Force
- Fraud
- Coercion

For purposes such as:

- Exploitation
- Forced labour
- Sexual exploitation
- Child trafficking
- Organ removal

It's a crime and a human rights violation affecting millions worldwide.

General Indicators of Human Trafficking

Personal Appearance & Behavior

- Appears anxious, fearful, or submissive
- Shows signs of physical abuse or neglect
- Avoids eye contact or is unable to speak freely
- May seem coached or constantly monitored

Lack of Control

- No control over personal ID or documents
- Doesn't know their home or work address
- Cannot move freely or speak alone
- Works excessively long hours without rest

Living & Work Conditions

- Lives where they work or in poor conditions
- Is not paid or wages are withheld
- Works in a place with high security or secrecy

- Has limited access to healthcare or outside communication

Unusual Travel or Recruitment Circumstances

- Was recruited through false promises
- Involves international travel with unclear arrangements
- Owes a large debt to an employer or recruiter
- Someone else controls their movement or decisions



Child Trafficking Indicators

- Not in school or involved in age-inappropriate work
- Has false identity documents or no ID at all
- Appears unusually mature or overly rehearsed in speech
